



The goal of the Collaborative is to leverage significant federal funds to reduce emissions from the most polluting diesel sources in the most affected communities. The Collaborative seeks to significantly improve air quality and public health by targeting the highest polluting engines with the most cost effective control strategies.

DERA 2017: Hawaii Public Works Vehicle & Transit Bus Replacements

The West Coast Collaborative (WCC) is pleased to announce the Hawaii Department of Health (HDOH) Clean Air Branch's (CAB's) receipt of a United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) Diesel Emissions Reduction Act (DERA) State Clean Diesel Program grant to replace heavy-duty diesel vehicles. This project will be implemented using \$339,263 in DERA grant funding combined with \$226,175 in matching funds from HDOH and \$1,093,180 in cost-share funds from participating fleets.

What is the project?

Replace four Class 5-6 legacy diesel public works vehicles with new vehicles powered by model year 2017, or newer engines, and replace one legacy diesel transit bus with a battery-electric vehicle.

Why is this project important?

HDOH CAB will partner with the Honolulu Board of Water Supply and the Hawaii State Energy Office to replace heavy-duty diesel vehicles operating near areas of Oahu with high population density. This project will reduce human health risk from toxic pollutants by reducing exposure to heavy-duty diesel exhaust in the communities where the partner fleets operate.

What are the environmental benefits?

Over the remaining lifetime of the 5 affected engines, these upgrades will reduce emissions of fine particulate matter (PM_{2.5}) by 0.2 tons, oxides of nitrogen (NO_x) by 5.5 tons, hydrocarbons (HC) by 0.6 tons, carbon monoxide (CO) by 1.6 tons, and carbon dioxide (CO₂) by 389 tons. Additionally, the

reduction of PM_{2.5} emissions will reduce black carbon (BC), which influences climate by directly absorbing light, reducing the reflectivity of albedo through deposition, and interacting with clouds.

Who were the partners on this project?

The project will be led by HDOH CAB, the governing clean air agency in the State of Hawaii, which received the DERA grant award through the WCC. HDOH CAB will then distribute the DERA grant funds to the participating fleets. HDOH CAB will be responsible for data monitoring and reporting for the project.

What is the West Coast Collaborative?

The WCC is an ambitious partnership between leaders from federal, state, local and tribal governments, the private sector, and environmental groups committed to reducing diesel emissions along the West Coast. Partners come from all over Western North America, including: Alaska, Arizona, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, California, Oregon, Washington, Canada, Mexico and the Pacific Islands. The Collaborative is part of the US EPA National Clean Diesel Campaign.
